Special Diet Policy

Division of Food and Nutrition



Purpose

To establish Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy standard operating procedures for meal accommodations that ensures students with disabilities have an opportunity to participate in and benefit from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Child Nutrition Programs, which are the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), the School Breakfast Program (SBP), and the NSLP Afterschool Snacks.

Policy

Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy supports access to healthy meals to all students through participation in the NSLP/SBP. This includes ensuring students with disabilities as defined under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, have an equal opportunity to participate in and benefit from the USDA Child Nutrition Programs.

Per USDA regulations 7 CFR Part 15b, Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy will make reasonable modifications to meals on a case-by case basis to accommodate students with disabilities including providing special dietary accommodations to students with a disability. A disability is an impairment, which substantially limits a major life activity, this can include allergies and digestive conditions.

Procedure

- 1. Request for a Special Dietary Accommodation:
 - Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy makes exceptions for special diets for disability reasons on a case by case basis when supported by a written statement of the need for substitutions. The written statement must include:
 - Brief explanation of how impairment restricts the diet
 - Food(s) to be avoided

- Food(s) to be substituted
- A student with a disability may have an IEP or 504 plan that requires specific instruction, services, or accommodation related to the student's nutritional needs. If a student's IEP or 504 plan contains the same information that is required on a Medical Statement for Special Dietary Needs, then it is not necessary to obtain and submit a separate Medical Statement for Special Dietary Needs.
- Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy makes exceptions for special diets for non-disability reasons on a case by case basis when supported by a written statement of the need for substitutions, unless other exempted by FNS, and signed by a recognized medical authority.
- Rainbow Dreams Early Learning Academy may make substitutions for fluid milk for non-disabled students who cannot consume fluid milk due to medical or special dietary needs when supported by a written statement from a medical authority or legal guardian. The written statements must identify the medical or other special dietary need that restricts the child's diet. These substitutions meet the nutritional standards established in the above statement.

- 3. Upon receipt of a request for a special dietary accommodation, the special dietary accommodation coordinator shall review the request to ensure it supports as required by federal law and district policy.
- 4. Following USDA Child Nutrition Program regulations, the school district may consider factors such as cost and efficiency and is not required to prepare a specific meal, provide a specific brand of food, or provide a meal beyond the meals provided to other students.
- 5. For students who have an IEP or 504 plan that requires specific food related accommodations, the school district shall provide the accommodation as required by law, seeking clarifying medical information, as necessary.
- 6. Parents/guardians will be notified of clarifications needed or approval of a special dietary request within 7 days.
- 7. A special dietary request or part of a request may be discontinued by a parent/guardian by submitting the request in writing to the special dietary accommodation coordinator

Complaints of Discrimination
